Behavioral Health

Continued support of the Alzheimer’s Association, which offered in-person and virtual services to **417 individuals** via the helpline, **526 care consultations**, support groups to **98 caregivers** and offered education to **822 individuals and their families** about dementia.



Hunger

Expanded the WIC and Senior Farmer’s Market Voucher Program to Sarpy County. Through six farm stand locations, **985 vouchers totaling \$2,955** were collected and matched, translating to \$6,000 worth of locally-sourced fresh fruits and vegetables for eligible low-income seniors, women, infants and children.

Hunger

Provided **\$12,500** to support the Double Up Food Bucks, SNAP incentive program in the Omaha Metro, and provided an additional \$12,500 in matching funds for Nebraska Community Foundation to receive a \$500,000 USDA grant to expand the successful program statewide.



Behavioral Health

Provided **\$5,000** to the Kim Foundation to support their mental health awareness and suicide prevention efforts.
