Community Benefit Report FY2022

To improve access to care, we extended primary care clinic hours and added two primary care physicians to our rural health clinic plus a Physician Assistant dedicated to hospital work. In FY23, we'll add four clinics to our speciality clinic (currently 24 clinics). We recruited and retained nurses for OB, inpatient, specialty and infusion programs, plus radiology and laboratory staff. We are proud of our \$1 million HRSA opioid grant which expands addiction treatment with a local facility, provider education and state-level discussions on prescribing laws.
