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Anatomic Pathology Specimen Identification and Labeling

Histology Specimens

- All tissue specimen containers <u>MUST</u> be labeled with the following:
 - a. Patient's full legal first and last names.
 - b. Date of birth OR
 - c. Clinic medical record number.
- d. Tissue site/source, including laterality (right or left) and orientation (upper, lower, inferior, superior, etc.) as applicable; use letter designations (A, B, C, and so on) as needed.
 - e. Date and time of collection.
- 2. Additionally, any container MUST be initialed by collecting personnel.
 - a. Specimens with removable lids need the primary container labeled, not the lid.
- 3. Use separate containers for each specimen.
 - a. Do <u>NOT</u> place multiple specimens into one container if they are from different body sites.
 - b. This is especially important for skin/mole biopsies that look similar.
 - c. It <u>is</u> acceptable to place several core biopsies into one container if cores are all from the <u>same</u> lesion, polyp, etc.
- All test requisitions <u>MUST</u> contain the following:
 - a. Patient's full legal first and last names.
 - b. Date of birth.
 - c. Clinic medical record number.
- d. Tissue site/source, including laterality and orientation as applicable; use letter designations (A, B, C, and so on) as needed.
 - e. Date and time of collection
 - f. First initial and full last name of collecting personnel
 - g. For **breast** tissue, the following is also <u>required</u>:
 - 1) Time specimen is placed into formalin.
 - 2) If formalin time is the same as collection time, note that both occurred at same time (i.e. collected and fixed at 0900).
- Information on specimen containers must exactly match information on test requisitions.
- Specimens will <u>NOT</u> be processed until any identification and/or labeling issues are resolved.
- Identification and/or labeling issues may result in delay of testing and results.
